Policy Aspects of the Development of Markets in Ecosystem Services

Ecosystem services (ES) are the benefits that flow to humans from well-functioning natural ecosystems. Recognizing and accounting for ES in markets can encourage greater protection and stewardship of ecosystems and foster new economic activities that are based upon healthy nature. The development of ES markets, therefore, can serve both environmental and socio-economic objectives. With the support of Alberta Innovates the Alberta Land Institute is examining the legal and policy components necessary to foster ES markets. In the process ALI is engaging both governments and stakeholders to inform policy discussions and ground-truth the work.

CURRENT STATUS

MAY 2020

The study of property rights in ES markets was completed in fall of 2019 and is available on the ALI website. Feedback gathered from policymakers and stakeholders will help identify policy issues that require further research, which will form the next step of ALI's work. The conference *Land Use 2020: A Place for Biodiversity Offsets* was planned for May 2020, with program and speakers confirmed and registrations underway, when it had to be postponed (to be rescheduled) due the Covid-19 pandemic.
